What are high-risk medications?

High-risk medications are those that may increase the risk of unwanted and potentially dangerous side effects in patients 65 years old or greater. Some concerning side effects include dry mouth, constipation, tiredness, dizziness or low blood sugar. These side effects may lead to more serious conditions, including blood clots, increased risk of falls and bone fractures.
